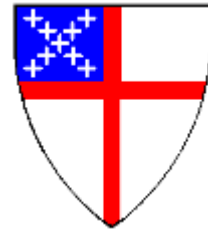
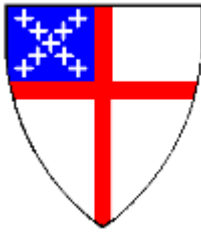

THE YEAR OF DECISION

"As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." ~ Joshua 24:15

We are ending the year of 2011 and entering the new year of 2012; let us hope it is a better year for all. This will be the Year of Decision for the Cathedral Church of St. Paul. It is being forced upon us because of our economic situation. The Cathedral, as many of you have known it, cannot continue without additional monies.

We are either going to serve the Lord Jesus Christ or we will have to fold up our tent. We cannot limp along as we have for the past ten years. Once the renovations to the Cathedral were completed, the majority of our endowments were gone for good. The Cathedral has no other reserves. Our combined pledges only pay for one half of our budget and we will run out of money, as the Chapter's letter to you stated, by the middle of this summer and staff members will be cut.

However, there is a solution. As I pointed out last summer in my sermon series: "Which Church?" has become "Why Church at all?", it is very simple - every member has to bring in one other person who will become a member. We are to make disciples for Christ and the money will follow. We can teach you how to attract and help people into the parish. All we need is your commitment to do it. We need to do this for spiritual reasons as well. If a church is not growing, it is failing in its mission:

"The mission of the Church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ".
from The Book of Common Prayer page 855

Please attend the Adult Christian Education hour, 9:15 a.m. - 10:15 a.m. on January 8th, 15th and 22nd for a course led by the Dean on getting people to come to church and to become members. Please plan on attending all three sessions.

Defining Church Terms

EPIPHANY SEASON

A season of four to nine weeks, from the Feast of the Epiphany (Jan. 6) through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. The length of the season varies according to the date of Easter. The gospel stories of this season describe various events that manifest the divinity of Jesus. The coming of the Magi is celebrated on the Epiphany. The Baptism of our Lord is observed on the Sunday after Epiphany. The gospels for the other Sundays of the Epiphany season describe the wedding at Cana, the calling of the disciples, and various miracles and teachings of Jesus. The Last Sunday after the Epiphany is always devoted to the Transfiguration. Jesus' identity as the Son of God is dramatically revealed in the Transfiguration gospel, as well as the gospel of the baptism of Christ. We are called to respond to Christ in faith through the showings of his divinity recorded in the gospels of the Epiphany season.

THE EPIPHANY

The manifestation of Christ to the peoples of the earth. The winter solstice was kept on Jan. 6 at some places during the first centuries of the Christian Era. In opposition to pagan festivals, Christians chose this day to celebrate the various manifestations, or "epiphanies," of Jesus' divinity. These showings of his divinity included his birth, the coming of the Magi, his baptism, and the Wedding at Cana where he miraculously changed water into wine. The day was called "The Feast of Lights." Celebration of the Son of God replaced celebration of the sun. Baptisms were done, and a season of preparation was instituted. It was later called Advent.

The solstice was kept on Dec. 25 by the fourth century. Jesus' birth was celebrated on this day in both eastern and western churches. The western church commemorated the coming of the Magi on Jan. 6. The eastern church continued to celebrate the Baptism of our Lord and the Wedding at Cana on Jan. 6. In the east the day was called "Theophany" (manifestation of God).

The coming of the Magi is celebrated on the Feast of the Epiphany, Jan. 6, in the BCP. The Baptism of our Lord is celebrated on the First Sunday after the Epiphany.

Blessing in Homes during Epiphany

An old custom in the Episcopal Church is to invite the Parish Priest to come and bless your home during the Season of Epiphany. If you are interested in having your home blessed, please contact the Cathedral Office or Dean Brodie.

Chapter Minutes

November 16, 2011

Members Present: Randy Abbott, Yemisi Arogundade, Susan Beard, Norman Hinton, Mark Kerhlikar, Martha Kichinko, Becky Miller, Joe Patterson, Barber Potts, Claire Ribelin, Norman Taylor, Paul Worrall, Constance G. Lynn, Clerk, Bill Ledbetter Finance Chair, Robert Smith, Treasurer, Robert E. Brodie, Dean, Lori Casson, Dean's Assistant. Also Attending: Candace Griffin, Chair Fall Festival Fund Raiser.

Fr. Brodie opened the meeting in the Café with a brief prayer at 7:00 p.m.

REPORT AND REQUEST FROM CANDACE GRIFFIN, CHAIR OF FALL FESTIVAL: Fr. Brodie asked Candace to make a presentation about the Fall Festival. Candace announced that although there is still some money coming in for the festival the estimated amount raised so far is approximately \$13,000.00. She will write a check to clear out the "Special Occasions" account that had been established for this activity when all the money has been received. She had some suggestions for next year's Fundraisers Committee concerning the spring Raffle and the Fall Festival that might make both easier to organize and complete. The problem of meeting deadlines for this year involved repeatedly extending them so tasks could be completed. People were still bringing in items on Saturday morning when everything had been set up. Next year a more workable timeline would make things easier on the committee and volunteers. One particular idea she proposed was to tie the fundraising activity to a specific charity sponsorship for part of the proceeds. This would be another way for St. Paul's to show outreach to the community. Her request for now is to designate 10% of the money realized from the Fall Festival to go to SPARC. Another request offered was a project by the Spirit Knitters to either knit or otherwise provide warm caps for the homeless this winter. The estimated expense for this project is \$300.00. We thanked her for her presentation and all the hard work the committee had done which brought us such success once again. We would consider her requests later during the meeting.

MINUTES: Martha Kichinko moved and Susan Beard seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the October 19, 2011 as given. Motion passed.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT: Bill Ledbetter distributed the finance report for October and reviewed it with Chapter members. The cash balance October 31, 2011 was \$21,244.00. Regular income \$20,753.00; an accounting entry for a changed status, -\$44,749.14 made the total for this portion of Total Income -\$21,308.16. Total Expenses \$41,160.42 yielded Net Ordinary Income of -\$62,468.58. Year-to-Date Net Income of -\$105,611.55. (See page titled Profit & Loss-Unaudited). Balance Sheet-unaudited for October 31, 2011 lists Assets and Liabilities & Equity. Total Liabilities & Equity \$7,919,857.01. Following his brief summary of this report information, he distributed the 2012 Preview Budget information.

BUDGET REPORT: The pledge cards for 2012 so far show \$115,000 from 58 pledging units. Calculations and estimates are based on the assumption that pledge income for 2012 will be the same as 2011. Page 1 of this report shows a three year cash flow chart, 2010, 2011, and 2012. This chart showed an estimated Pledge Income of \$201,521.00. Current year expenses, \$389,451.00 a number that is stable and consistent. Several items are listed under "Uses" category. Summary information shows that there is an estimated cash flow deficit in 2012 of \$184,470.00 and this must be financed or addressed in some way. The second portion of the Summary explains the consequences if no action are taken. "(2). If no action is taken, the ending balance at the end of 2012 is estimated to be zero and there would be \$112,000 of unpaid bills. It is expected that the church would be out of cash and have to stop paying an average of \$16,000 a month in bills from June through December". On page 2 of this report, the chart gives a detailed listing of 2011 Est., 2012 Preview with \$ Change from 2011 Est. and the % Change. The Categories listed are Sources of Cash, Expenses, and Other Uses of Cash on Balance Sheet. After reviewing the information on these three pages of the report, Chapter members discussed the impact for the parish and made some suggestions for changes and informing the congregation of this extremely serious situation that needs to be addressed immediately. On Page 3 Bill assembled a 2012 Budget Tasks chart for the Chapter members to work on. The first four items listed were ones which could be approached immediately. After he explained how this chart could be used, the Chapter decided further discussion needed to be done in Executive Session which began immediately. Following the Executive Session portion of the meeting, Randy Abbott made this motion seconded by Norman Taylor: A committee will be formed with me [Randy] as chair to have a letter written to inform parishioners about our current situation and signed by the Chapter Members. Norman Hinton will serve as Co-Chair. Motion passed. Norman Hinton made a new motion seconded by Norman Taylor that a committee be formed to find alternatives to our financial situation on an ongoing basis and work to try out any new ideas that may be suggested. Motion passed. Fr. Brodie, Randy Abbott, and Norman Hinton will compose an additional letter about these matters to be sent to the whole congregation.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS: Workman have been in to do maintenance work on the boilers before the heating season begins.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Susan Beard (Pastoral Care) commented that a parishioner asked her about the feasibility of purchasing new Prayer Books as some of those in the pews show obvious wear and tear. This was for informational purposes only. Norman Hinton plans to change his Adult Education Class to February since planned additional knee surgery conflicts with the original schedule.

NEW BUSINESS: Chapter members returned to Candace Griffin's request earlier in the meeting about using 10% of the proceeds of the Fall Festival for outreach. Norman Hinton moved and Claire Ribelin seconded a motion to allow Candace to use 10% of the proceeds of the Fall Festival for outreach purposes. Motion passed.

Claire Ribelin gave us an update on the Cookbooks. They will be shipped Friday or Saturday. She also found an article in the *State Journal Register* about a Cookbook Roundup to be published on December 7th for any organizations that have published cookbooks this year. This will be an excellent opportunity to publicize our new cookbook. She will make the necessary contacts to do this. Claire brought up another topic for informational purposes concerning the Illinois State Library. If an individual is a state employee she suggested he/she get a library card for it as it contains a multitude of resources and other items which may be purchased. The library is run by the Secretary of State's office [Jesse White] and the State Librarian. Anyone can use this facility.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND ADJOURNMENT: Fr. Brodie gave us an update on parishioners who are undergoing medical procedures or recovering from recent episodes of illness and hospitalizations. The December meeting of the Chapter will be our annual dinner meeting at the Brodie's on **Monday, December 12, 2011 at 6:00 p.m.** A list of items for the Chapter members to bring will be distributed at a later date. Since there was no further business to discuss, Norman Taylor moved and Joe Patterson seconded a motion for the meeting to adjourn.

Following a brief prayer, the meeting ended at 9:20 p.m.

PARISH NURSE BY SUE BLASE, R.N., B.S.N.

Every day I discuss cholesterol levels with my patients. If you do not know your number, your Total Cholesterol, HDL, LDL, and Triglycerides, you need to have blood work done through your Health Care Provider. How old should you be to start checking your cholesterol? I found an article in our own SJ-R from the Associated Press, "Doctors: Test for Cholesterol by Age 11", and I totally support this viewpoint. In fact, when we were living in Upstate New York, my daughter, Christy, had a cholesterol screening done while in second grade that was optional in our Health Care Plan. The philosophy behind this is "Fat deposits form in the heart arteries in childhood but don't usually harden then and cause symptoms until later in life". They feel that testing now will not prevent future heart attacks, but waiting may be too late for children who have hidden risks. They also recommend blood sugar screening every two years starting at age 9, especially for overweight children or children with a family history of diabetes. The guidelines for early testing are based on certain facts:

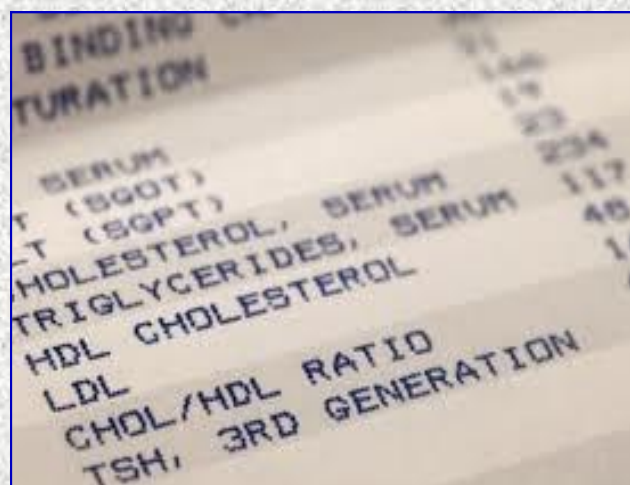
- "By the fourth grade, 10-13% of U.S. children have high cholesterol, defined as a score of 200 or more."

- "Half of children with high cholesterol will also have it as adults, raising their risk of heart disease."


- "One third of U.S. children and teens are obese or overweight, which makes high cholesterol and diabetes more likely." Typically, cholesterol screening is only done on children with a known family history of heart disease, high cholesterol or risk factors including obesity, diabetes or

high blood pressure. This misses about 30% of children with elevated cholesterol levels. The article does point out an obvious risk with early screening, and that is treating a number instead of a risk factor. I do feel that early screening can be a valuable wake up call to families to make important lifestyle changes, that include healthy eating, weight loss, daily exercise, and no smoking around the children.
